The Rector's Report

I Know That My Redeemer Lives

At the most recent parish vestry meeting, one of our members led the group in a Bible meditation that dealt with the subject of loss. He had us read 1 Peter 1: 1-9, "By God's great mercy God has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ ... with an indescribable and glorious joy." He talked about all of us, individually and as a parish, having the possibility of unresolved grief. He noted that we mourn not only the deaths of cherished loved ones, sometimes one after another, but also other significant losses like relationships, jobs, old homes, health, our roles within our families and communities, and countless others. We grieve both the big and little deaths that happen in our lives every day.

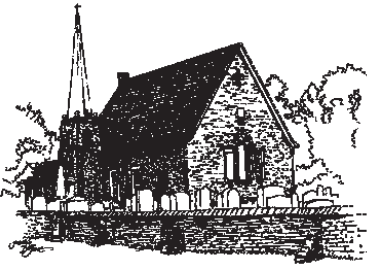
Together we have suffered a series of devastating losses that take our breath away. There is a danger of becoming numb from such losses, of burying the pain deep within us and putting on a brave front. There is also a danger of becoming overwhelmed by our losses and sinking into despair. By realistically recog-

nizing our grief, we can better turn to God as the source of our comfort, healing, hope and joy.

A former parishioner and dear friend called recently after hearing about the parish's most recent losses. He called with words of encouragement and then he

asked, "Father Max, what can you tell me right now to help me make sense out of all this?" I can not explain away our losses, but my faith tells me that it is obvious that God does not micromanage our health but allows freedom in creation, otherwise our dear loved ones would have lived

to be 125 years old. Additionally, knowing the risks, God sent God's son to share in the joys and horrors of human life and to show us another way to live. When our ancestors rejected Christ and killed him, God would not let death be the final answer, but raised Christ from the dead. We share in the resurrection of Jesus Christ, and through the power of the Holy Spirit share in everlasting life.

As I pray in the opening anthem of our burial services, "As for me, I know that my Redeemer lives ..." This knowledge, this experience of the Living God in our midst, through God's grace and mercy, gives us the strength to go on. We offer up our big and little losses for God to redeem as we entrust our lives and those of our loved ones into God's loving care.

CHRIS' CORNER

On the Margin

As many of you know, I like to spend part of my day off at Camp Arrowhead, the diocesan camp on Delaware Bay in Lewes. I often spend a couple of hours just wandering around the property, enjoying the sights and sounds of woods and bay.

My favorite place at the camp has become that margin of land where woods and bay meet. You break out of the womb-like protectiveness of the forest and stand on the edge of that vast expanse of water and bay, imagining Portugal three thousand miles away. I'm not sure why this margin of land between woods and bay has become by favorite place at Arrowhead. But it probably has something to do with exactly that quality I am trying to describe, that it is the meeting place between the familiar and the unfamiliar, between protectiveness and expansiveness.

Margins are very fertile places. I think it was writer and naturalist Rachel Carson who described coastal areas where land and water meet as being places of unusual abundance and diversity of life.

I think this quality is true of margins in general -- that they are places where life expresses itself with unusual vigor. Psychologically speaking, we all experience margin-places throughout our lives. The first few years of marriage are such a time and a place. New children in the home is another. The first few years of starting a career are a margin place. And so also is retirement, especially those early years when

you are still "finding your way" in the new and unfamiliar life chapter.

Margin places have two characteristics. At first they may be unsettling and disorienting. You haven't yet found your secure footing. But margins are also places of incredible insight and creativity. You experience connections and intuitions in the margins that you seldom do later on in life when things have become more settled and predictable.

These reflections are a preface to observe that many of you have been or will be going on vacation during these couple of months. The fact is, a vacation is a margin place. It is an opportunity to step back and take a long view, to take stock and reassess. Vacations are of course fun but they can be even more than that. They can be opportunities for setting (or re-setting) your course for the next year, even when you do not consciously intend to do this. And so, by all means, do have fun this summer. But also consider taking advantage of this precious "margin time" in your own life.

July 29-Aug. 1 Antiques Show Celebrates Its 60th Year

The annual All Saints' Antiques Show is scheduled for **July 29-August 1** this, it's 60th, year! It is thought to be the longest-running show of its kind on the East Coast.

It returns to the Rehoboth Beach Convention Center with exhibitors from seven states already confirmed to show their wares. The proceeds of the show go to help with our outreach in the local community.

One of the show's highlights comes on Wednesday evening, **July 29**, with the **Preview Party** from 6 to 8 p.m. Preview Party chair Dorsey Johnson says it promises to be an evening of sociability with friends combined with a first look at the quality of antiques on display.

Tickets to the Preview Party are \$30, which offers unlimited attendance over the three-day period. The show will be open to the public from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Thursday, **July 30**, Friday, **July 31** and Saturday, **August 1**. Regular admission is \$7.

All Saints' Church, the show's sponsor, is the only church in Rehoboth Beach still on its original site and maintaining its original design.

"Notes For The Journey"

A small white cloth lies damp under my watchful gaze. Damp is best, before the wrinkles have hardened and the whole piece has to be sprayed with water and rolled up and left to soften again. Steam rises as the iron hits the fabric with a sharp hiss and glides over it, smoothing out the wrinkles. Turn and fold a third of it in, and carefully press. Three more times, each time turning a third of it in until it is a square with the little cross perfectly centered.

After washing the altar linens I am ironing them, something I have never done before, so I am very careful. Though I am doing my best, I am afraid that my ironing skills are woefully inadequate. I frown. The edge of the purificator bulges unevenly, though this is concealed when I fold it inward. The cross on the corporal is heavily embroidered and takes a lot of going over. The tiny linens for the portable communion kit are so small they are as attractive as a doll house, and take hardly any time at all. This is definitely an unseen and very holy ministry. The linens are pure white, as clean as we can make them, pristine enough to be put into God's service. Spilled drops of wine will show as clearly as drops of blood on snow.

Tomorrow during the Eucharist I will unfold the corporal one third at a time, and align the cross at the edge with the cross on the altar cloth. A round loaf of bread will be brought up and placed in the center. The purificator will rest over the chalice until the wine is poured into it, and after all has been set out the acolyte will pour water over my hands and I'll dry them with the linen towel draped

over her arm. We will bow slightly to each other afterwards, acknowledging the action, moving on to the next part of the service.

Tomorrow I will hold up the bread for everyone to see, holy bread for holy people, and the wine, Christ's very essence poured out for us. People will come and hold out their hands for the bread, and will drink from the beautiful silver chalice, which will be wiped clean after each sip with the very linens I am now ironing. They will come and kneel down for the one moment in the week when God smooths the pain of life as a mother smooths the brow of a fevered child, as the iron erases the bumps and wrinkles of the altar linens.

So I concentrate, for nothing is too small in the service of the Lord, and every single part is important. And I pray for everyone who will eat the holy meal tomorrow, everyone haunted by the sorrows of the past and everyone frightened by the demands and wounds of the present. I pray to be worthy, to be useful as the fine cloth under my fingers. The iron gurgles when I set it down, an amusing sound in the midst of all this spiritual thinking. 2009 MS 'Almost-Walk' Declared A Great Success

Members of the Zoom-Zooms MS Walk Team thank everyone in All Saints' Church & St. George's Chapel for their extraordinary support. Although the weather did not allow us to actually walk, thanks to Fr. Max, Fr. Chris and many other parishioners, we're still No. 1 in Kent & Sussex Counties.



All Saints' Church began presenting a series of organ recitals by their newly appointed Director of Music, Craig Campbell, last month on June 25. They took place and will continue each Thursdays at 12:15 p.m., following the 11:30 a.m. service of Holy Eucharist, until August 13.

"Bach on the Boardwalk" will feature the Granville Munson, Jr. memorial Peragallo pipe organ (2005) of thirty-five ranks -- one of the few such instruments in Sussex County.

In addition to a work of Bach, Campbell will play transcriptions of orchestral and piano works which appeal to a wide audience of classical and non-classical audiences.

"The organ is an instrument associated with funerals and horror movies," says Campbell who holds degrees in music from The Julliard School and Yale University.

"However, in Paris where I performed recently the organ has a cult following. Attendance at recitals," he continues, "outnumbers attendance at Mass -- a sad fact -- but does perpetuate a vibrant musical and cultural tradition which spans centuries."

Baroque music specialists joined Campbell at the June 25th recital, including Fritz Hesserer, Myrl Powell and Professor Adam Marsh. Organists Tom Tibbetts and Betsey vonDreele will appear at subsequent recitals. Guillermo Silveirra has composed a piece for organ, "Jabez Prelude," which will have its world premiere.
